Or Fun at Niagara Falls By Ron Gaumont

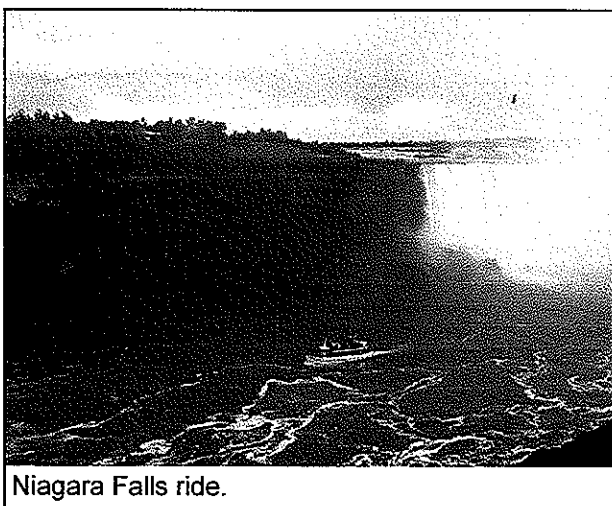
Many of you have already read in the "National Reporter" the details of the business end of the past 2003 NDC (part 1). However, some of our members may be interested in some of the social gatherings and excursions that were available to the members who wished to venture out and explore some of Niagara Falls, Canada's beautiful nearby countryside.

Adjacent to the historic Brock Plaza Hotel (the host hotel) and connected directly via enclosed walkway, was the Casino Niagara for those who wished to challenge the Canadian slot machines, card tables and roulette wheels. Although I did notice some of the conference attendees here, I didn't hear of anyone who walked away with any winnings. Oh well, better luck next time.

Directly behind the hotel, the Clifton Hill area presents a carnival like atmosphere with over 40 attractions and restaurants. The young at heart felt right at home and with plenty to see and do. We walked through this area and saw the Great Canadian Midway, Ripley's Believe It Or Not!, Movieland Wax Museum, Dinosaurs Park Miniature Golf and the Rumours Night Club. We decided to chow down at the very colorful "Rainforest Restaurant". Young kids and young at heart just love this place.

Within walking distance, beyond a beautiful park and atop Murray Hill was the Niagara Falls IMAX Theaters. This theater is six stories high and has a 12,000 watts surround sound system. Here we saw the IMAX movie "Niagara: Miracles, Myths and Magic". We discovered the myths of Indian legends, the miracles of death-defying feats and the magical aerial vistas captured in a way only IMAX technology can. It was a great show.

Adjacent to the IMAX Theaters is

the Skylon Tower in the Fallsview Area. On top of the Tower is the spectacular Skylon Revolving Dining Room. An elegant setting, 775 ft. above the falls, it provides a breathtaking view of the illuminated falls. The dining room revolves one rotation hourly. This was quite an extraordinary dinner. The Conference had arranged two excursions for the attendees who wished to participate. The first was the "Maid Of The Mist" boat ride. Maid of the Mist is one of North America's oldest tourist attractions, and its history is full of stories of daredevil rescues and visits from royalty. We stood at the bow, swathed in the provided rain gear. It was an exciting trip where the boat pasted directly in front of the American Falls, the Rock of the Ages, the Cave of Winds and entered the Horseshoe Falls for a spectacular view. We felt the mist spray on our faces, heard the rumble of the water and could sense the vast power of it all. At one point, all we could see was the thick cloud of mist from the falls.

The second excursion was a tour of Niagara-on-the-Lake's wine region and tasting at the Hillebrand Estates Winery, Canada's leading producer of premium VQA wines. This tour made various stops along the Niagara River en-route to Niagara-on-the-Lake. At the winery we were able to taste the very unique "Icewine".

Icewine is produced from Gamay and Riesling
grapes. Unlike most vines, these grapes are al-
lowed to remain on the vine into the winter until they
freeze. This allows the grapes to reach their maxi-
mum sweetness and produces a very unusual but
tasty wine. On our return trip back to the hotel, the
tour bus made a stop at Niagara-on-the-Lake for
some local shopping and perhaps a bit to eat. This
was a very enjoyable tour.

So as you can see, there are plenty of things

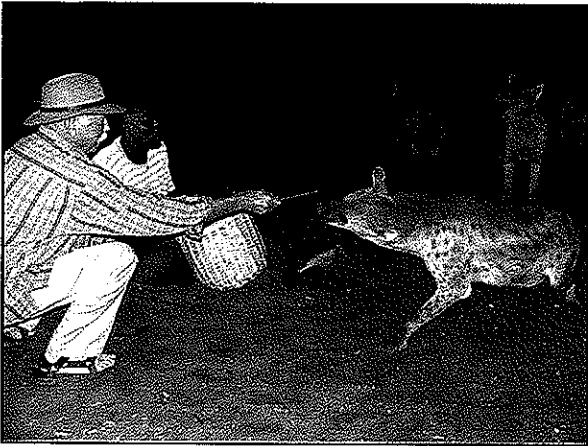

A short note to let you know we have successfully completed our mission on the African Continent and returned home.

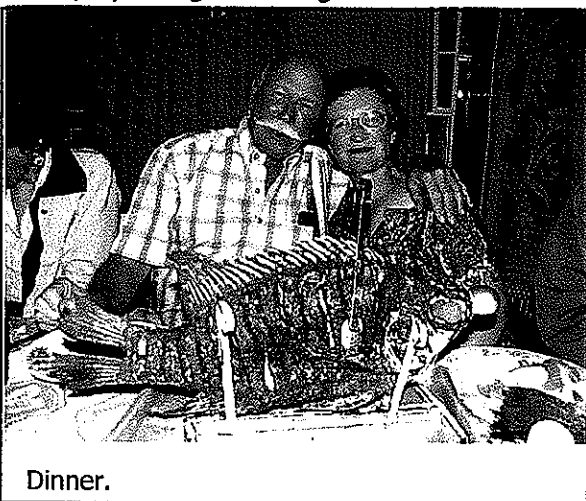

Brunch Bunch Waist Watch

Did you make a New Years resolution to drop a few pounds? Well, the all you can eat buffet brunches that we all look forward to, test your resolve. If you own a computer and have Internet access, here is an easy way to keep track of what your eating and keeping track of your New Years resolution. The U.S. Department of Agriculture has an interactive Web site that lets you keep track of your eating habits and exercise for 30 days.

On the site, you create a personal profile, giving your age and weight. You can update the information if your weight changes. Next, you list and search for all of the foods you ate in one day. When finished with your list, click on the analysis button will generate a nutritional breakdown of your diet. This analysis is helpful if you want to keep track of certain nutrients, such as iron or calcium, or if you want to count carbohydrates or calories. On the physical activity page, you select the types of exercise you do. An analysis will tell you the amount of calories you burn and give you an assessment. The website is easy to use, and once you create a list of foods you eat frequently, it doesn't take much time to update it daily. Information is kept for 30 days so you can spot eating and exercise patterns.

Go to: www.usda.gov/cnpp/ Under the projects column on the right side, click on "Interactive Healthy Eating Index and Interactive Physical Activity."

Note: In my particular case, I put in my age and weight and a new window appeared with the website for "Save the Whales" Then when I listed all the foods I ate in one day, a window appeared that said, "Please insert an additional page" Then when I went to the Physical activity page, I entered "Watch auto racing on TV" A new window appeared that said, "Select an activity with more physical activity". So, I entered "Watch football on T.V." The screen went blank. I hope you have better luck. Howard

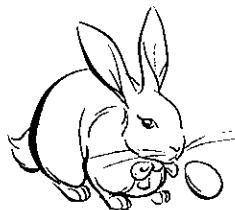
